A Cleveland Landmark

Ben Franklin Community Garden is a jewel in the crown of Cleveland's Old Brooklyn neighborhood. Established as a community garden in 1981, through an agreement between the Old Brooklyn Community Development Corporation (OBCDC) and the Cleveland Board of Education, it is one of the largest and most productive garden sites in the area.



Today the garden has more than 200 individual plots, covering 500 square feet each, also available as half plots or smaller raised beds. The garden is enrolled in Cleveland's Community Gardening Program, Summer Sprout, a partnership between the city and Ohio State University. Every effort is made to promote an environment where local gardeners work together to grow needed food, support each other, and continue a tradition that roots and supports the surrounding community. Each season residents from across the county, who come to Benji to garden, share the bounty by donating as much as 5,000 pounds to local hunger centers and food pantries.

The Ben Franklin Garden, or *Benji*, as it's known, has a long history and a notable tradition. It was in 1919 that the land that would become the school and gardens was purchased by the Cleveland Board of Education. The school was built in 1923 and the 5 acres in the rear were dedicated to garden use, originally as a nursery. In 1924 the first horticulture classes were taught to students. Part of the grounds became a tract garden in the

Cleveland Public Schools garden program, which author Joel Mader describes as "the most successful, innovative, and copied program in the United States." After the schools ended the program in the wake of financial difficulties in the late 1970s, the tradition of growing in this serene, eco-friendly urban site was taken up by the community garden. Now, the Garden has received Urban Garden District zoning.



Besides the tilled 3 acres, the grounds include a berry patch and a wooded area with a distinctive variety of trees. Master Gardeners from OSU Extension maintain a student horticulture program garden, a Perennial Garden, Herb Garden, and Demonstration Vegetable Garden. A charming garden classroom has been renovated and is still in use. A new pavilion provides an inviting outdoor space for musical concerts, classes, and other community events.

The community garden keeps a plot of perennial native flowers beside an enclosed area for beekeeping. Ben Franklin school and garden have been designated as a Cleveland Landmark. The grounds are a Monarch (butterfly) Waystation and a Certified Wildlife Habitat®.
