Raised Bed Gardens

Raised bed gardeners~ The garden is open on the 1st and 3rd weekend of the month - 10am-4pm- weather permitting and Thursdays when the Master Gardeners are in session with the children.

Make sure to have your pathways and beds clear of weeds. We have been unsuccessful in obtaining wood chips. Therefore, it is your responsibility to supply wood chips in the pathways around your bed.

Compost Bin Outside the Gate

As a reminder gardeners are to either dig a hole in their plot for weeds or bag them up and take them home. As a reminder Rule 20 has been changed and no gardener should be placing garden waste in the compost bins.

The garden is still accepting home compost in the large can outside the garden gate. See the info graph on what is compostable.

You may also throw produce from your garden that is NOT diseased or donatable in the compost bin outside the gate- no weeds may be placed in the bin.

Community garden = community of gardeners

Our garden is shared space and courtesy is crucial. This reminder may seem hackneyed and preachy but as the season begins it bears repeating so we all have a positive, productive and enjoyable gardening experience.

Respect the resources. Besides the land, all tools, water, and other resources are shared. Being courteous ensures that these resources are used responsibly and fairly. It means being mindful of others' needs, following guidelines and directions, and not monopolizing or misusing available resources.

Good Neighbor Policy. For the benefit of your bordering gardeners and all gardeners good order is in order. Being courteous involves: following agreed-upon rules for your space and our common spaces; upkeep of your space, to wit weeds; staying within your space; cleaning up after oneself. It ensures that the garden is a pleasant and fruitful place for everyone.

"(What's so funny 'bout) peace, love and understanding." Consideration for others. Gardeners have different preferences and needs and hurdles. Practicing courtesy involves respecting and being considerate of these differences and

challenges. Good-faith behavior and avoiding actions that may negatively impact others' gardening efforts. Being respectful in your communication with others. It allows for better understanding of each other's perspectives and promotes problem-solving and conflict resolution. Rely on your Coordinator and Committee members to step in instead of escalating any disagreement. Makes for a less stressful season.

Grow relationships. Be willing to help fellow gardeners when needed. Offer guidance, share knowledge. The courtesy you practice encourages mutual encouragement, appreciation, and celebration of each other's achievements. You feel valued and respected, all feel valued and respected. Win-win.

Sept 2nd – Tim McDonald Quartet, led by saxophonist Tim McDonald, the quartet explores jazz with a mix of standards and original tunes influenced by Global folk and Black American music.

Sept 16th – **Red Campion,** a piano accompanied vocal quartet you will be tapping your toes to. A mixture of show tunes and opera sung by celebrated Cleveland artists: Lara Troyer, lyric coloratura soprano; Denise Milner Howell, mezzo-soprano; tenor Timothy Culver; baritone Brian Johnson, and pianist, Judith Ryder.
